## Pet Policy

Although dogs are permitted on the fairgrounds, there are rules to follow:

- Dogs must be on a leash and under control at all times
- Dogs are not permitted in any buildings with the exception of service dogs
- Dogs must be kept away from livestock, exhibits and show ring
- Please to not leave pets unattended in your vehicle
- Please clean up after your pets to keep our grounds clean


## Rules

1. All exhibitors must have a current Bonfield Agricultural Society membership prior to fair. Membership fees: $\mathbf{\$ 5 . 0 0}$ per person or $\mathbf{\$ 1 0 . 0 0}$ for family. Family includes parents and all children 18 years and younger living at the same address.
2. It shall be lawful for, and the duty of, the Treasurer to retain the annual membership fee from any prize monies awarded to an exhibitor, as payment of said membership for the following year.
3. Exhibitors are required to fill in an entry form, and it will be kept by the Society. You can make a copy to keep for yourself.
4. Mail entry form to: Bonfield Agricultural Society, Box 84, Bonfield ON P0H 1E0 by August 1 to allow us time to write out entry tags. Additional entries may be added on Thursday when entries are brought in. Entry tags will be available the week of the fair.
5. All exhibits must have an entry tag attached or they will not be judged.
6. All exhibits must be made by the exhibitor during the year following the preceding fair.
7. No person shall receive a prize for any exhibit that, in the opinion of the judge, is not worthy. Prizes may not necessarily be awarded to each class. The Judge's decision is final.
8. EXHIBITS ARE JUDGED FRIDAY MORNING THE WEEK OF THE FAIR.

Exhibits must be entered on Thursday the week of the fair between 12:00 noon and 7:00 p.m. Exhibits must remain at the fair until Sunday at 4:00 p.m.
9. All exhibits will be at the owner's risk. The directors will use every reasonable precaution for the safety of the exhibits, but shall not compensate any exhibitor for articles lost, damaged or stolen. The exhibit hall is open during the fair for everyone to view and will be locked in the evening.
10. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per section/article. Example: Class 2 Flowers you may enter up to 10 different entries, but cannot enter the same article twice.
11. All weight requirements and number of specimens must be entered exactly as stated, otherwise they will be disqualified.
12. If species named - you must write the type on the entry form or it will not be judged.

## Class 3 Roots and Vegetables Guidelines

## Notes:

- All exhibits must be entered on Thursday between 12:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.
- All roots and vegetables are of the same size and shape, cleaned and properly trimmed
- Must enter exact number of items and proper sizes to qualify. Number listed after each article is the number of items needed
- Free from disease, insect damage or blemishes


## Beets

- $\quad 2$ to 3 inches in diameter
- Top trimmed to $3 / 4$ inch above the crown
- Rubbed clean, not washed or scrubbed
- Root may be trimmed to 1 inch approximately


## Carrots and Parsnip

- Tops removed $1 / 2$ inch above the crown
- Tap roots should be left on
- Roots may be washed but not scrubbed

Garlic

- $\quad$ Soil brushed off, not washed
- $\quad 1$ to $1-1 / 2$ inches tops attached
- Roots trimmed to within $1 / 4$ inch of the bulb
- Same number of cloves per head


## Onions

- Trim tops 1 to 2 inches above the bulb
- Well dried, firm and same size
- Only jagged and dirty outer scales should be removed, not peeled
- Roots should be removed just below the bulb


## Peppers

- Smooth surface and uniform in colour
- Stems should be $1 / 2$ inch


## Potatoes

- Potatoes should be true to variety and free from greening
- Brushed clean, no skin damage in cleaning
- Should be smooth, uniform size


## Pumpkin

- Stems to be left on
- May be washed
- Hard and mature

Tomatoes

- Tomato should be true to type, well matched, firm and free from cracks
- Calyx not to be removed

- All yeast breads and buns to be baked fresh
- No commercial mixes allowed in any section / class
- Entries to be on paper plate or Styrofoam plate, use appropriate size plates don't use large plate for cookies or squares, and put in sealed clear plastic bag NO SARAN WRAP.
- Tape the entry tag on the outside of the plastic bag
- Cake and cupcakes can be covered by a clear plastic dome
- Tarts to be full size tarts, not mini or bite size

- Shell texture smooth, thick shell wall, no opaque, spotty patches when held to candling light, no cracks, no wrinkles
- Size should be all even, all eggs the same grade
- Colour should be consistent
- Shell clean but NOT washes, no visible dirt, stains or shiny surfaces
- 1 egg will be cracked open by the judge looking at the yolk: round, yelloworange, no blood or meat chunks visible


## Maple Syrup

- Free from fermentation
- Uniform in colour, free from cloudiness
- Extra light, light or medium colour
- Maple flavour, free from bad odours or tastes

## Rules

1. Exhibitors must be a Bonfield Agricultural Society member
2. A junior member if 15 years old and younger
3. All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor. Parents are encouraged to offer advice and supervise craft activity and baking
4. Can only enter one entry for each article in their age category
5. Junior members can enter in their age group and any articles that are not listed in their aged group, into Junior classes higher than their age group, but cannot enter junior classes below their age group. Cannot enter duplicate item for example: play dough item must be entered in your age group - any questions please ask us
6. Junior members may also enter in classes 1 to 15
7. Mail entry form by August 1 to allow us time to write out your entry tags. Mail to Bonfield Agricultural Society, Box 84, Bonfield ON P0H 1E0. Additional exhibits can be added on when you bring in your exhibits
8. Entry tags can be picked up the week of the fair
9. All entries are to be brought to the fair grounds on the Thursday, the week of the fair, between 12:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.
10. Exhibits are judged on Friday morning and can be picked up on Sunday after 4:00 p.m.

## Helpful Hints

- Have fun making your exhibits
- Use white Bristol board, please no foam Bristol board
- The Dollar Store is a great place to buy craft supplies
- Ask your parents, grandparents for advice - you have to do the work but they can explain how to do exhibits
- Read carefully - follow instructions exactly - the judge measures and counts items
- All entries should be clean and well made
- For vegetable entries look at page 6 for guidelines on how to display vegetables
